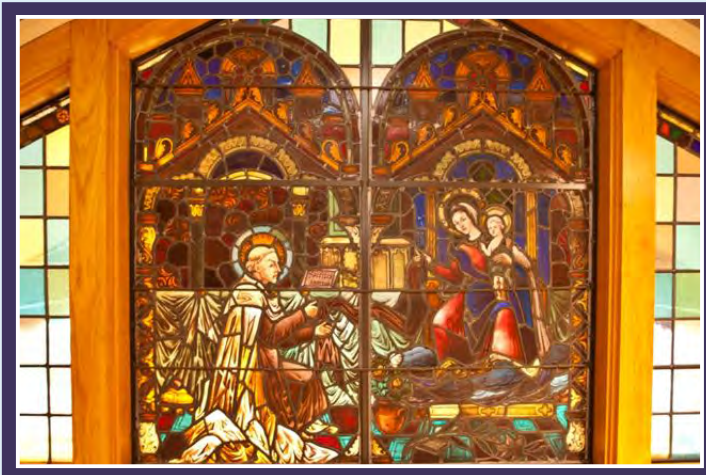

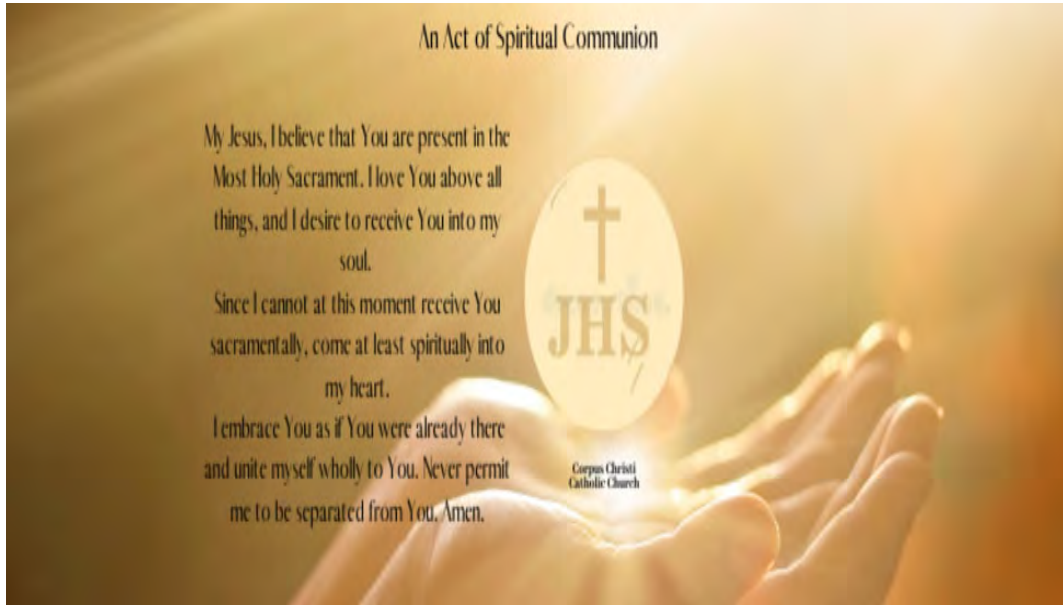
VINCENTIANS CONTINUE TO HELP THOSE IN NEED

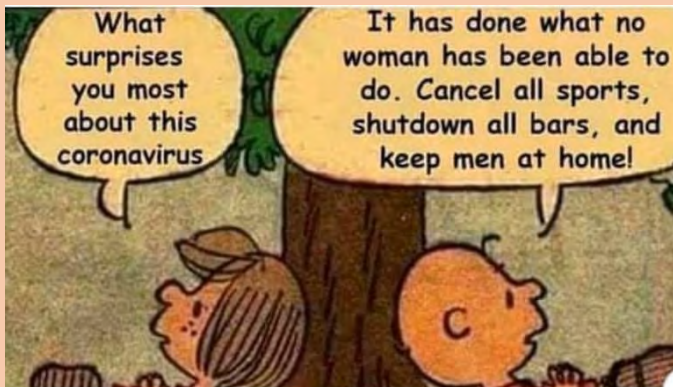
Day of Prayer for Humanity

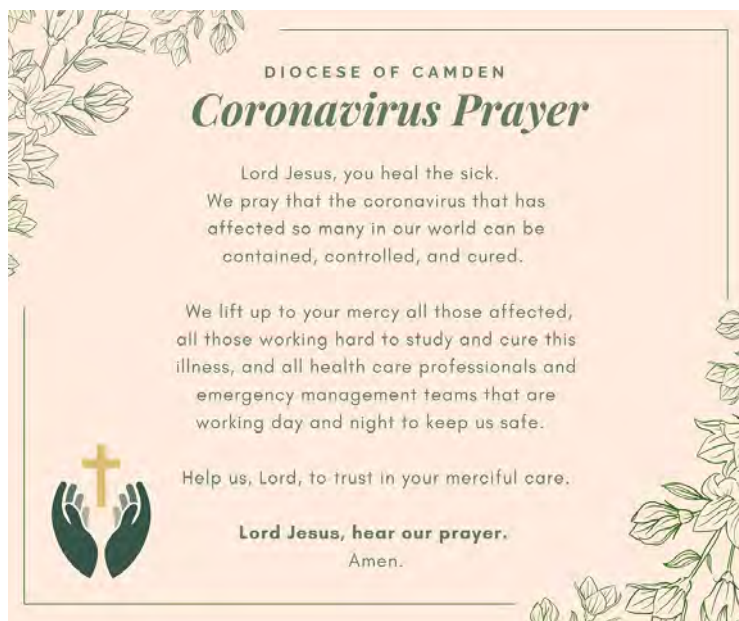

MEMORANDUM



To: All Diocesan Entities
From: Father Robert Hughes, V.G.
Date: May 13, 2020
RE: Covid-19 and Updates on Diocesan and Parish Operations

As you know, Governor Murphy's executive order requiring New Jersey residents to stay-at-home has been extended until at least June 6th. The Governor is expected to announce this week a set of hard dates for the process of reopening. If this allows us to open earlier, I will notify you. Until then, please remain safe and well. Bishop and I continue to pray for all of you and appreciate the work you are accomplishing from home.

This means that the **administrative offices of the Diocese** (all three buildings) will remain closed through June 6th, 2020 at least. If you need to retrieve items from your office in order to continue your work from home, please notify me in advance through your department director. Please respect social distancing requirements and wear face-coverings if you need to access any of the buildings.

Parish Offices should likewise remain closed to the general public. If parish staff are needed to process financial matters or produce the parish bulletin, the pastor can have them come in as long as they are well and respect social distancing requirements.

School Offices should also remain closed to the general public. The principal is free to call in staff members and faculty so as to properly support the ongoing education of students and the distribution/collection of educational materials.

Father Rocks will be in touch regarding **Confirmations** scheduled before June 6th. **No May Processions** may be scheduled at this time. The **Diocesan Wedding Anniversary Mass** scheduled for Sunday, June 14th has been postponed. The **Ordination to the Diaconate** will take place on Saturday, June 13th. The **Ordination to the Priesthood** will take place as scheduled on June 20th. If restrictions are still in place on those dates, the ordinations will take place on these dates but with limited in-person attendance. More details will follow.

Date: May 9, 2020
RE: Drive-in, Drive-by and Drive-thru Activities

Several times since the beginning of the lockdown in the State of New Jersey, Bishop Sullivan has directed that parishes and school not schedule, encourage or participate in drive-in, drive-by and drive-thru activities at parish or school properties.

The coverage of these events on the news each and every day has made them seem to be the next best thing to being there.

You are reminded that such activities are NOT TO TAKE PLACE in the Diocese of Camden for Mother's Day blessings, May Processions or any other reason.

Just because others are doing so, doesn't make it right, acceptable or permissible for our parishes and schools do to so. In addition, there is a civics lesson in this for all of us – the Executive Order of the Governor is that the citizens of New Jersey are to STAY AT HOME except when conducting essential activities such as a doctor's appointment; obtaining groceries; or going to a pharmacy. "Drive Activities" parish and school activities do not constitute essential business.

RE: PREPARING for Public Masses with Strict Limits on Public Gathering (PHASE 1)

WHEN Governor Murphy issues an executive order permitting the re-opening of various segments of society, limits on the size of public gatherings will likely be restricted to 10 people or less, although larger gatherings in “places of worship” may be permitted if strict physical distancing is maintained. It is expected during PHASE 1 that **gatherings for Worship in New Jersey Mass will be limited to not more than 25% of the capacity of the church building** – please note that this directive may be revised up or down as progress in combatting the virus is monitored. **When official word is given for the resumption of worship, you will be notified of the specifics. This document is intended to help you prepare, plan and communicate with your parish community.**

Pastors are to schedule a meeting with the parish staff to review the following directives and are required to submit a plan no later than May 29th. Given Governor Murphy’s extension of the State of Emergency until June 6th, public worship is not expected to be permitted until after that date. A planning guide is provided at the end of this document.

In the Diocese of Camden, Bishop Sullivan issues the following directives to pastors and parishes for the resumption of public Masses which will become effective ON A DATE TO BE DETERMINED – due notice will be provided:

1. The dispensation for the faithful from the obligation to participate in Mass on Sundays and Holy Days **remains effective throughout Phase I of re-opening.**
2. Pastors are to encourage those who are at **high risk for contracting COVID-19 to stay home.** When home visits are permitted, a priest, deacon or Eucharistic Minister may visit with Holy Communion.
3. The elderly and families with young children (who may find it difficult to maintain a six-foot distance from others) are encouraged to stay home.
4. Pastors are to remind the faithful that on any given day when they have a cough or feel sick, that they are not to participate in Mass or visit the church for any ceremony.
5. All parishes are **to provide hand sanitizer at the entrance(s) of the Church.** Doors must be clearly marked as ENTRANCE ONLY and EXIT ONLY (emergency doors may be employed during this time if necessary as EXITS). The faithful should not, if possible, use the same doors for entering and exiting. Pathways to and from the church must be clearly marked with tape to remind people to stay 6 feet apart.
6. Parish maintenance teams **must regularly clean and disinfect** commonly-touched surfaces in the church ([CDC Guidelines for Facilities](#)). **Hymnals, missalettes and other materials generally left in the pews must be removed.** Worship aids may be produced if necessary for one-time use. Please be mindful of **copyright laws** involving the reprint of music and texts. Microphones and other shared equipment also need to be disinfected.

7. In accord with current public health recommendations, the faithful should wear cloth face coverings when in public, including when they come to church. Surgical masks or N-95 respirators are not recommended. Cloth face coverings **should not be placed on young children under age 2**, anyone who has trouble breathing, or anyone otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance ([CDC Guidelines on Face Coverings](#)).
8. In Phase I, a Catholic church or chapel may hold public Masses of more than 10 persons (taking account of local health guidance), as long as it maintains strict physical distancing. For a public Mass, to maintain strict physical distancing **THE FOLLOWING PREPARATIONS ARE REQUIRED:**
 - a. The faithful are to maintain a 6-foot distance from each other at all times. You may **use tape to close off rows of seating** in the church (*caution tape or colored painter's tape are recommended*), in order to guide the faithful to sit at least 6 feet from each other (for example, allow seating every third row and six feet apart in a given pew).
 - b. Members of a single household do not need to practice physical distancing with each other and so may sit together in the same row – planning and identifying where families may be seated will need advanced consideration.
 - c. In areas where the faithful might stand in line (for example, waiting to go to confession; receive Holy Communion; use the restroom), **place tape on the floor to indicate proper spacing** between persons (*colored painter's tape is recommended – you may want to test whatever is used to be sure that it doesn't ruin the carpet or finish on the floor*).
 - d. Station competent volunteers (wearing masks and gloves) at the entrances of the church to help “direct traffic,” to ensure that the faithful keep 6 feet from each other while entering and exiting the building. Those who are assigned these duties will need to have some basic training and must be given the answers to common questions. They should also be instructed to be non-confrontational. Consider well who is chosen for these duties.
 - e. Dismiss the congregation by rows at the end of Mass to **avoid crowding at the exits** (this should be easy since Holy Communion is to be distributed at the end of Mass - see below).
 - f. Encourage the faithful to maintain physical distancing everywhere on the church property (on the church steps, in the parking lot, etc.).
 - g. **Develop and communicate a plan for restroom use:** limit the number of people who enter a restroom at the same time, and place tape (*colored painter's tape is recommended*) on the floor outside of the restroom to indicate where people should stand in line to wait for the restroom, while maintaining a 6-foot distance from each other. Instructions should also be given that the **facilities are for emergency use only** given as they cannot be cleaned properly between each use. Parishioners should be reminded to use the restroom **BEFORE** they come to church.
 - h. Choirs are discouraged, especially if seated together. Vigorous singing, especially in close proximity to others, may increase the risk of viral spread.
 - i. Church cry-rooms and chapels are to be closed when Mass is being celebrated in the main church. Access to a restroom may be provided but no one is to be seated in these spaces.

9. **FOR THE CELEBRATION OF MASS, THE FOLLOWING MUST BE OBSERVED:**

- a. A priest with a respiratory infection of any kind should avoid celebrating public masses or administering sacraments during Phase 1. The same holds for other ministers who might serve at a Mass (deacon, lectors, musicians, sacristans, ushers, etc.).
- b. Altar servers are not to minister during Phase 1.
- c. The **priest celebrant and other ministers are not to wear masks or gloves** during the celebration of Mass. Instead, they should remain more than 6 feet from the congregation during the entirety of the Mass. In such circumstances, there is no substantial risk of infection.
- d. To the extent possible, the other ministers (a deacon, lectors and musicians) should maintain a 6-foot distance from the priest and from each other. The priest should place the missal on a stand at the chair or even on the altar when he recites the presidential prayers, rather than having someone hold the book. **All ministers must maintain a proper distance in the sacristy and during the entrance and recessional processions.** If necessary, given the configuration of the church, consider modifying the procession's route in order to maintain a 6-foot distance from members of the congregation. When marking the places to sit – pastors must be mindful that the ends of the pews may be less than 6 feet from the center aisle where the entrance and recessional processions will take place.
- e. **The offertory procession (bringing up the gifts) is to be omitted.**
- f. A deacon (if present) may bring the missal, chalice, paten/ciborium, and cruets of wine and water to the altar, while the priest remains at the chair. (Alternatively, the priest could do this himself.) After the deacon moves away, the priest comes to the altar and arranges the items on the altar if not already done by the deacon.
- g. The lavabo should be done by the priest alone, without assistance, either at a credence table near the altar or at the side of the altar itself.
- h. Special provision should be made **for the collection** -- **baskets should not be passed from person to person.** Long-handled baskets could be acceptable if the ushers can remain a suitable distance from others. **Baskets may be placed in central locations to receive the collection but must be monitored.**
- i. If hosts for the communion of the faithful are to be consecrated, they should be placed on a second corporal towards the side of the altar. This allows the priest to prayerfully speak the words of consecration directly over the host he will consume, with the other hosts on the altar but not directly in front of the priest as he speaks the Eucharistic prayer.
- j. For the elevation of the sacred species at "Through him, and with him, and in him," if a deacon is present, he may stand alongside the priest and elevate the chalice. Since this action is brief, he need not remain 6 feet from the priest while doing so.
- k. **Holding hands during the Our Father is not permitted except among family members. The invitation to the faithful to exchange a sign of peace is to be omitted.**

10. THE DISTRIBUTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

Holy Communion is to be distributed **AFTER the celebration of the Mass** – this respects the symbolic and liturgical integrity of the Mass (which should be celebrated without mask or gloves); avoids any practices in the Mass that could become sources of future liturgical abuse; gives a greater freedom to the faithful to determine whether or not they will come forward for Holy Communion (some may be nervous about doing so); and also provides for additional precautions to reduce risk. It also permits the priest to remove his chasuble for the distribution of Holy Communion, given that it is difficult to launder if anyone should sneeze or cough on him.

- a. At the start of Mass, or at a suitable point during Mass, the priest should explain that those who desire to receive Holy Communion may do so at the conclusion of the Mass. He may add that the faithful are to maintain a 6-foot distance from each other as they come forward for Holy Communion.
- b. The **Precious Blood is not be distributed** to the faithful, nor should the faithful receive the Eucharist by intinction.
- c. A sufficient quantity of hosts for distribution to the faithful should be consecrated at the Mass.
- d. The priest (and, if present, the deacon) would consume the Eucharist in the normal way, but would not immediately proceed to distribute Communion to the faithful. Rather, the newly-consecrated hosts would be briefly placed in the tabernacle awaiting the conclusion of the Mass.
- e. After the concluding blessing and the dismissal, the priest (and deacon, if present) remain in the sanctuary. At the chair, the priest **removes his chasuble and the deacon removes his dalmatic**.
- f. A small table should be placed at each communion station, with an unfolded corporal and a bottle of hand sanitizer.
- g. The priest (and any other ministers distributing Holy Communion) should use hand sanitizer immediately before approaching the tabernacle. **He may also don a surgical mask or cloth face covering**. (NB: If the priest who has celebrated the Mass is in a higher-risk group, a different priest, arriving at the conclusion of Mass, might distribute Holy Communion in his place).
- h. Now vested in alb and stole (a cope is not to be worn), the priest retrieves the newly-consecrated hosts from the tabernacle and returns to the altar.
- i. Holding up a single host, he says: “Behold the Lamb of God. Behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.” He then leads the people in saying: “Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word, and my soul shall be healed.”
- j. The priest (and other ministers if present) proceeds to the place prepared for distribution of Communion. Each stands next to a table with corporal and hand sanitizer in order to distribute Communion.
- k. The faithful should remove any face coverings **before coming forward** for Holy Communion.

l. Holy Communion may not be distributed with gloves, nor may it be received in the hand if a member of the faithful is wearing gloves. During Phase 1 – the faithful are encouraged to not receive Holy Communion on the tongue. It is forbidden to use tongs or any other implement for the distribution of Holy Communion. A pastor/priest may instruct those who wish to receive Holy Communion on the tongue to wait until the end since more hand purification on the part of the priest may be required.

m. If the priest, deacon or Extraordinary Minister touches the hand or tongue of the person receiving Holy Communion, they should place the ciborium on the corporal and proceed to sanitize their hands before distributing Holy Communion to the next individual.

n. At the conclusion of the distribution of Holy Communion, the priest (and any other ministers) return the remaining hosts to the tabernacle.

o. The faithful may depart after making a brief prayer of thanksgiving using only the EXIT doors and maintaining physical distancing – volunteers may be required to assist in giving directions.

11. The ban on DRIVE-IN, DRIVE-UP or DRIVE-THRU Masses remains in effect for all parishes in the Diocese of Camden.

12. Parishes are not permitted to schedule additional Masses beyond the regular Sunday Mass schedule. One or more Masses may continue to be broadcast via live-stream.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS – the following may be done beginning on the same date when public Masses are once again permitted.

Sacrament of Baptism for Infants – Pastors may begin to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism keeping in mind the requirements for physical distancing. With the exception of twins or multiple children in the same immediate family, **baptism is to be celebrated for one child at a time.** A bowl of water may be brought from the baptistery to the center of the church in order to facilitate the participation of those gathered but who must remain at a distance from one another. **New water is to be used and blessed for each baptism.** Only the parents of the child may approach the font with the priest or deacon for the actual baptism. Priests and deacons are reminded that they must wash their hands in between baptisms and that the sacred oils should be dispensed in small quantities so as to not contaminate a larger container. NB: The new Order of Baptism of Children is mandated as of Easter Sunday.

Easter Sacraments – the baptism and/or reception into full communion of those who were prepared for the Easter Vigil is postponed until the Fall. Bishop Sullivan's Office will provide further information about a suitable date or dates for these celebrations.

Sacrament of Confirmation – In PHASE 1, the celebration of Confirmation will not take place. Father Rocks will be in touch with further information when that becomes available.

Celebrations of First Holy Communion – Pastors may celebrate First Holy Communions but must observe all of the protocols in place for PHASE 1 (including the limit of no more than 25% occupancy in the church).

Sacrament of Matrimony – Pastors may celebrate weddings in accord the protocols in place for the celebration of Mass. These protocols are likewise to be applied when a marriage is celebrated outside of Mass. If a wedding needs to be celebrated before restrictions are lifted, please contact Father Hughes for permission and instructions.

Sacrament of Penance – all current precautions and protocols regarding the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance remain in place. **DRIVE-UP confessions continue to be prohibited.**

Funerals – Pastors may celebrate funeral Masses in the parish church as long as all protocols for physical distancing are applied. Funeral directors will need to explain the limits on the number of people who may be in attendance and the requirement that they wear masks. All attendees are to be seated BEFORE the liturgy begins. The presider alone may conduct the rituals at the doors of the church prior to the entrance procession. If Mass is celebrated, Holy Communion is to be distributed AFTER Mass and the prayers of Final Commendation. The faithful are to then proceed directly to their cars. The funeral directors can attend to the casket in the recessional procession.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick – all current precautions and protocols remain in place.

RE: Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord

A meeting of the bishops of New Jersey took place via Zoom earlier today. In that meeting, the bishops agreed that the observation of the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord would be transferred in the Province of Newark from Thursday, May 21 to Sunday, May 24th (replacing the Seventh Sunday of Easter).

There was a robust discussion about the importance of holydays and there is no intention to make this a permanent change in the liturgical calendar of the Province of Newark. The transfer is for this year only; and was made to ease the burden on those who are required for live-streaming Masses and in light of the dispensations already provided in all five dioceses from the obligation of the faithful to participate in Mass on Sundays and Holydays.

Please inform your parishioners of the change and make note that Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the Sixth Week of Easter are to be celebrated as such and in accord with the prescriptions of the Roman Missal and the Lectionary.

Thank you for your attention to this matter.

Closure of Catholic Schools for Remainder of the Academic Year

The following memorandum was sent to all priests and school principals of the Diocese of Camden earlier today by Fr. Robert Hughes, vicar general of the diocese, on behalf of Bishop Dennis Sullivan:

On Saturday, March 14, 2020, Bishop Dennis Sullivan issued a statement temporarily closing all Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Camden effective Monday, March 16, 2020. In his statement the Bishop noted that the schools likely would be closed for a minimum of two weeks.

Given Governor Murphy's executive order closing schools in the State of New Jersey for the remainder of the academic year, Bishop Sullivan extends the closure of all Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Camden through June.

Catholic high school and eighth grade Graduations will take place on the dates already scheduled, but will likely take the form of a "virtual graduation". Further directions on graduations and other year-end activities will be provided to principals by Dr. Bill Watson, Superintendent of Schools, and the Office of Catholic Schools.

Students and families are encouraged to follow the directives from the New Jersey Department of Health and Human Services as we continue to work together for the common good, to slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus and prevent further infection.

Bishop Sullivan is well aware that closure of our schools for the rest of the academic year places an enormous burden on parents and will be challenging for families. At the same time, he is impressed by the creativity of all involved in bringing the classroom into the living rooms of our children across the Diocese.

Please continue your prayers for the health of our students, their families, our dedicated teachers, administrators and staff members, and for all people as together we face the deepening effects of this worldwide pandemic.
